What Is TZIELD?

TZIELD is a prescription medicine used to delay the onset of Stage 3 type 1 diabetes, which is when your body can't make enough insulin on its own and may require insulin injections. TZIELD is for adults and children 8 years of age and older who have Stage 2 type 1 diabetes. This means that they have tested positive for 2 or more type 1 diabetes-related autoantibodies, have abnormal blood sugar levels, and do not have type 2 diabetes.

It is not known if TZIELD is safe and effective in children under 8 years of age.

How Is TZIELD Given?

- TZIELD is an intravenous (IV) infusion. This means it's given through a needle into a vein in your arm
- Infusions are given once a day, every day for 14 days in a row
- Each infusion is at least 30 minutes long

Beginning Your TZIELD Journey

Discuss with your doctor whether TZIELD is right for you or your loved one. This may involve reviewing educational materials on type 1 diabetes and TZIELD, treatment expectations, and your infusion options. Your doctor may also order blood tests to help ensure TZIELD is right for you and that you are ready to submit for insurance approval.

Once you and your doctor have decided that TZIELD is right for you or your loved one, your journey begins!

Starting TZIELD and Insurance Approval



Consider a Site of Care (SOC) and **Infusion Method**

- Identify infusion locations (office, home, or both) that work with your insurance coverage, location, transportation, and scheduling needs
- · Talk to your doctor about different infusion methods, such as a daily IV infusion, a midline, or a peripherally inserted central catheter (PICC)
- Share your choices with TZIELD COMPASS, which will work with your health plan to review coverage and help your doctor obtain approval



Your doctor will explain your treatment options and help you decide which method and location are best for you.



What is the most important information I should know

about TZIELD? TZIELD may cause serious side effects. These include:

your healthcare provider right away if you develop any signs and symptoms of CRS during treatment with TZIELD • Decrease in white blood cells. TZIELD may cause a decrease

• Cytokine release syndrome (CRS). Signs and symptoms may

start during the first 5 days of TZIELD treatment and could

include fever, nausea, feeling tired (fatigue), headache, muscle and joint pain, or increased liver enzymes in your blood. Tell

- in a type of white blood cell called lymphocytes. A decrease in white blood cells is a serious, but common side effect that can affect your body's ability to fight infections. A decrease in white blood cell counts can happen after your first dose. Your white blood cell counts will start to go back to normal after your fifth dose of TZIELD. Some people may develop longer and more
- severe decreases in lymphocytes Your healthcare provider will do blood tests to check your liver and your complete blood counts before you start treatment and during treatment with TZIELD. During and after your treatment with TZIELD, your healthcare provider will check for serious side effects, as well as other side effects, and treat you as needed. Your healthcare provider may temporarily or completely stop

Before or after receiving TZIELD, tell your healthcare provider

your treatment with TZIELD, if you develop liver problems, have a serious infection, or if your blood counts stay too low.

What should I tell my healthcare provider before receiving TZIELD?

about all your medical conditions, including if you:

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- or keeps coming back · have recently received or are scheduled to receive an
- immunization (vaccine). TZIELD may affect how well a vaccine works. Tell your doctor that you are receiving TZIELD before receiving a vaccine • are pregnant or plan to become pregnant. TZIELD may harm your unborn baby. Do not receive TZIELD during pregnancy and
 - · are breastfeeding or plan to breastfeed. It is not known if TZIELD passes into your breast milk and if it can harm your baby. Talk to your healthcare provider about the best way to feed your baby if you receive TZIELD
 - Tell your healthcare provider about all the medicines you take, including prescription and over-the-counter medicines, vitamins, and herbal supplements.

The most common side effects of TZIELD include:

leukopenia (decrease in white blood cell counts) · headache
