A guide to STARTING TREATMENT

What is TZIELD?

TZIELD is a prescription medicine used to delay the onset of Stage 3 type 1 diabetes, which is when your body can't make enough insulin on its own and may require insulin injections. TZIELD is for **adults and children 8 years of age and older who have Stage 2 type 1 diabetes.** This means that they have tested positive for 2 or more type 1 diabetes-related autoantibodies, have abnormal blood sugar levels, and do not have type 2 diabetes.

It is not known if TZIELD is safe and effective in children under 8 years of age.

IMPORTANT SAFETY INFORMATION

What is the most important information I should know about TZIELD?

TZIELD may cause serious side effects. These include:

• **Cytokine release syndrome (CRS).** Signs and symptoms may start during the first 5 days of TZIELD treatment and could include fever, nausea, feeling tired (fatigue), headache, muscle and joint pain, or increased liver enzymes in your blood. Tell your healthcare provider right away if you develop any signs and symptoms of CRS during treatment with TZIELD.



DELAY STAGE 3 T1D?

The onset of Stage 3 T1D can have a major impact for you or your child. People in Stage 3 will eventually need insulin for the rest of their lives. More time can help you to prepare for the future.

IMPORTANT SAFETY INFORMATION (CONT'D)

What is the most important information I should know about TZIELD?

TZIELD may cause serious side effects. These include:

• **Decrease in white blood cells.** TZIELD may cause a decrease in a type of white blood cell called lymphocytes. A decrease in white blood cells is a serious, but common side effect that can affect your body's ability to fight infections. A decrease in white blood cell counts can happen after your first dose. Your white blood cell counts will start to go back to normal after your fifth dose of TZIELD. Some people may develop longer and more severe decreases in lymphocytes.

How TZIELD WILL BE GIVEN

TZIELD is an intravenous (IV) infusion. This means it's given through a needle into a vein in your arm.



Infusions are once a day, every day for 14 days in a row

Each infusion is at least 30 minutes long

YOU WILL ALSO NEED SOME EXTRA TIME BEFORE AND AFTER EACH INFUSION. THIS IS SO A NURSE CAN PREPARE THE INFUSION AND MONITOR YOU AFTERWARDS.

If you miss a scheduled infusion, your doctor will continue your treatment on the next scheduled day. You will not receive 2 infusions on the same day.

AFTER YOU'VE BEEN PRESCRIBED TZIELD, ENROLL IN TZIELD COMPASS

Your COMPASS Navigator will confirm your insurance coverage and provide information about financial assistance options that may be available. What is the most important information I should know about TZIELD?

Your healthcare provider will do blood tests to check your liver and your complete blood counts before you start treatment and during treatment with TZIELD. During and after your treatment with TZIELD, your healthcare provider will check for serious side effects, as well as other side effects, and treat you as needed. Your healthcare provider may temporarily or completely stop your treatment with TZIELD, if you develop liver problems, have a serious infection, or if your blood counts stay too low.

IMPORTANT SAFETY INFORMATION (CONT'D)

What should I tell my healthcare provider before receiving TZIELD?

Before or after receiving TZIELD, tell your healthcare provider about all your medical conditions, including if you:

- have a serious infection or an infection that does not go away or that keeps coming back.
- have recently received or are scheduled to receive an immunization (vaccine). TZIELD may affect how well a vaccine works. Tell your doctor that you are receiving TZIELD before receiving a vaccine.

TIPS FOR INFUSION DAYS

Get a good night's sleep
 Drink plenty of water

- beforehand
 Bring a book or activity to
- keep yourself entertained
 Eat a nourishing meal,
- unless otherwise instructed by your doctor
- Wear comfortable clothing
- Pack your or your child's favorite snacks
- Have your child bring their favorite toy
- Ask about bringing a friend or family member to sit with you during your infusion
- Create a fun countdown calendar for each infusion

Talk to your doctor if you miss any infusion days. You may need to continue the next day to complete all 14 infusions.

OTHER MEDICATIONS

For the first 5 days of treatment, your doctor will give you medicines to take before the infusion. These could include certain types of painkillers, antihistamines, and anti-nausea remedies. They may help reduce any fever, headache, muscle/joint pain, or nausea that may be caused by a possible side effect of TZIELD.

TZIELD may cause serious side effects. During and after treatment with TZIELD, your doctor will check for serious side effects, as well as other side effects. They may treat you for these or decide to stop treatment if you develop liver problems, have a serious infection, or if your blood counts stay too low. Follow up with your doctor


TZIELD can cause a side effect called cytokine release syndrome, or CRS. Signs and symptoms of CRS include:

- fever
- muscle and joint pain
- headache
- feeling tired (fatigue)

What should I tell my healthcare provider before receiving TZIELD?

Before or after receiving TZIELD, tell your healthcare provider about all your medical conditions, including if you:

- have a serious infection or an infection that does not go away or that keeps coming back.
- have recently received or are scheduled to receive an immunization (vaccine). TZIELD may affect how well a vaccine works. Tell your doctor that you are receiving TZIELD before receiving a vaccine.
- are pregnant or plan to become pregnant. TZIELD may harm your unborn baby. Do not receive TZIELD during pregnancy and at least 30 days before a planned pregnancy.
- are breastfeeding or plan to breast feed. It is not known if TZIELD passes into your breast milk and if it can harm your baby. Talk to your healthcare provider about the best way to feed your baby if you receive TZIELD.

Tell your healthcare provider about all the medicines you take, including prescription and over-the-counter medicines, vitamins, and herbal supplements.

What are the possible side effects of TZIELD?

The most common side effects of TZIELD include:

- rash
- leukopenia (decrease in white blood cell counts)
- headache
